Discussion:

“Causing ripples”

July/August 2008

Hymn “Come let us sing” VU 222

Scripture Matthew 10: 40-42 “He who receives you receives me, and he who receives me receives the one who sent me. Anyone who receives a prophet because he is a prophet will receive a prophet’s reward, and anyone who receives a righteous man because he is a righteous man will receive a righteous man’s reward. And if anyone gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones because he is my disciple, I tell you the truth, he will certainly not lose his reward.”

Prayer Let us pray together – O God of the prophets and our God, we have struggled with you in lonely places and praised you in the company of your people. We have cried out to you and you have shown us your steadfast love. We have resisted you and you have drawn us back into the circle of Christ’s disciples. Pour out your blessing on each one of us. Hear our prayers, and renew our spirits. Amen.

Reflection To accept, to welcome, to receive are all active verbs. It’s not just a matter of recognizing someone as Messiah, prophet, or righteous person, but what we’re willing to do about them. Are we accepting them, welcoming them, receiving them? For not to receive actively those whom Jesus sends, is to reject Him. And what about the way we engage with a child of God who loves God but is estranged from church or biblical interpretations? We do well to remember that, inside our church structures and our club environs and out in the margins where the accepted or rejected live.

There are three Godcentric ripples here: receiving a Jesus follower means receiving Jesus which means receiving God. Another trinity which includes not only Jesus’ humanity inside it, but ours too; yours and mine; personally and corporately as Jesus’ Body, making us real insiders. Does the life of our club flow through all three ripples? If there are no ripples, maybe our pond is stagnant, rather than living water.

What Jesus says next underlines our responsibility to care for each other as fellow ‘little ones’. But what exactly is ‘the cup of cold water’ needed by those around us. When our neighbour tells us, “No thank you, I don’t need any help”, can we be aware enough to know their real needs and sensitive enough for them to let us give them that ‘cup of cold water’ without infringing their pride or dignity.

Our churches do a good job of setting up some “welfare agencies” to meet some of the needs of people. Our National organization provides assistance for some blind persons, some campers, and some students. But that doesn’t let us off the hook of personal responsibility Jesus calls us to have towards those in need. Maybe we need some low key ‘cups of cold water’ by little people for little people, disciples or not? And then humbly demonstrate with these ‘cups’ to Whom we all belong, across all three ripples.

Discussion What starting place can we find to begin some such rippling?

Closing prayer Let us pray –For your abounding grace, we give thanks, O God. For your steadfast love, we pour out our gratitude. May our service to you and to other people provide for those who seek refuge from doubt, from oppression, from ignorance, and from calamity. Through our service in Christ’s name, we seek to grow in the Spirit of One who gave life itself for us. Amen.

Scripture Luke 10: 1-3

‘After this the Lord appointed seventy-two others and sent them two by two ahead of him to every town and place where He was about to go. He told them, “The harvest is plentiful, but the workers are few. Ask the lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field. Go, I am sending you out like lambs among wolves.” ‘

Reflection Do we see the work that we do each day as a part of God’s work and God’s plan? Do we see that there are many tasks that need to be undertaken to bring about justice and peace in our world? Do we name justice and peacemaking as the work of God and therefore as our work as well? God calls us to do the work that needs to be done.

In his book “If it is to be it’s up to me”, Author Thomas B. Smith tells of the powerful impact this attitude has in every area of his life. As he states in the first chapter, “An optimistic outlook on life has many advantages. It means you’re solution oriented and a possibility thinker. You look for the good. When you have a positive attitude, you’re more likely to be committed and achieve your goals and dreams.”

When we follow that message, “if it is to be, it is up to me”, as we work in our church and in our community, then we can know that we can do the work that God needs us to do.

There are many in the Bible who heard God’s call. Abraham, Samuel and Isaiah all heard it and gave the same answer, according to scripture. Isaiah heard God asking, “Whom shall I send and who will go?” They all replied, “Here I am, send me.”

In modern times, many have heard God’s call – some to be teachers, others doctors and nurses, social workers or labourers. It does not matter what the task, if it is done in a spirit of love and justice. It does not matter where the work is to be accomplished. It is our work, it is God’s work. God calls each of us to share in the coming of a world of peace and justice

Discussion What is our work at these stages in our lives?

Closing prayer Let us pray – God of call, help us to listen to your voice. Your work is our work. Our work is your work. Give us the will to follow where you lead, to reach out in love, to struggle for justice. Grant that we, with courage and daring, will stand up and be counted among your servants. In Jesus’ name. Amen.

Reflection:

Some minor sports seem to be the only groups able to attract new recruits. As an aside and a major shift for teenage boys most are no longer even interested in classic/ antique cars. Well, so what! Do you realize that church related groups are the most generous givers of both time and money to help the poor and support their communities. Check out the national stats on volunteering and donations. If they notice or care I have seen no word from any government agency. When the crunch comes in the next couple years, not a decade but very soon, who will pick up the slack? I am talking about feeding and housing the poor, school breakfast programs, sending kids to camp, sponsoring refugees. Without church groups and service clubs none of the above will get looked after in the same way. If the government does wake up and notice, and take over, you can be sure it will not be volunteers. I can see Canada as a large socialist country, strong unions and high, very high taxes.

Discussion:
