



Fund Distribution

We contributed \$400.00 from the funds raised by AOTS to provide nursing texts for nursing schools in Korea. Local material which was delayed in the sending, because no one had the funds to cover the costs of this freight. We felt that this also was a most appropriate use of AOTS contributions, since it will make a major contribution to the development of health care services in Korea.

Outreach

Our Hospital in Bella Bella has undergone some changes in the recent past, and in addition to carrying on regular general hospital services, the staff there conducts clinics in Ocean Falls*. Rivers Inlet, and other surrounding communities. This involves travel by boat and plane, and in the winter months often involves being stuck for long periods of time and being unable to return because of weather problems.

*The areas described have an average rain fall of 325.1 cm. or 128 inches.(heaviest in Canada). With Ocean Falls supplying the higher figures. Being socked in is a way of life as it is surrounded on all sides by mountains. Rain accompanied by heavy winds reduces visibility to zero. In its hey-day Ocean Falls was a Pulp Mill Town. The mill occupied the harbour with the town occupying the side of a mountain. There was one main street and it was a plank road. On the left perched on the mountainside were the residences on the right also hanging on to the cliff were the stores and service centers such as a community hall and swimming pool. To-day the population is about 12. The Mill is no more.






