### National Prayer Breakfast

Thursday, April 9, 1992 has been set as the date of our National Prayer Breakfast. Not in my lifetime has there been a greater need for our nation to turn to Almighty God for help. Reconciliation has been chosen as the theme for this year's Breakfast. The desire for reconciliation, while a necessary starting place, must move from words of intent to action. Otherwise, it is not likely reconciliation is being sought but capitulation. Repentance(change) is the action that needs to take place to lead us to healing. But repentance itself can only come out of an act of humility. One therefore might

take God's advice to Solomon:

"if my people who are called by my name humble themselves, pray, seek my face and turn from their wicked ways, then I will hear them, forgive their sins and heal their land"

The Prime Minister, Mr. Chretien, Mrs McLaughlin, Speakers Carbonneau and Fraser and the Chief Justices have all agreed to participate. Janice Filmon has been asked to provide the keynote address. She is someone who is in the midst of the political scene and a reconciler. I am confident she will bring a message of hope and inspiration. Janice is the mother of four children, and mothers without the gift of reconciliation do not survive!

Howard Hughes, former Governor of Iowa and U.S.Senator will address the gathering at the Leadership Dinner on the eve of the Breakfast. Howard is most interested in Drug and Alcohol and Drug abuse recovery programs and to this end has been working faithfully over many years with our Aboriginal peoples.

The Leadership Seminar following the Breakfast is to be co-chaired by Quebec M.P. Gabriel, and Newfoundland M.P. Admiral Fred Mifflin. There will be several speakers and a chance for dialogue. Over 20 individual M.P.s have agreed to take the Seminar participants in parties of 6-8 to their individual offices for lunch to conclude the time.

A Youth Dinner is also planned with students participation from English and French Universities.







### Hospital **Project**



Dr. Peter Reports.

Dear Fellows,

At Baie Verte., Nefoundland - as of late January 1992 the Division of Mission in Canada at its Annual Meeting, agreed that we withdraw our administrative relationship with the hospital and medical services in Baie Verte.

The reasons were multiple but the main ones were that-

- (1) We were not getting physicians coming through the Church any longer in sufficient numbers to staff the hospital with United Church recruited physicians. This meant that we were having some difficulty in maintaining the level of quality care that we would want there. (3) the time for the idea of a medical mission in Newfoundland has really long past.


