1994 Budget Slashed Membership Dues Up Delegates Approve.


Overview

The executive officers, regional representatives, and committee chairmen reported in full. Nominations and recommendations were prepared for presentation at the general business meeting.

Budget Paring

The finance committee brought to the innual meeting a proposed budget for 1994 totalling \$46,425.00. The immediate response was that it was not realistic in its relationship to our membership. A budget totalling \$37,600.00 was agreed upon and taken to National Association business meeting and there accepted. The pie charts on this page simplify our income as against our expenditures. Also accepted by the delegates was an increased membership fee to \$15.00.

Yes that is what the national executive recommended to the delegates and they agreed unanimously. Why you might ask? To operate under a reduced and balanced budget in these trying fiscal times that's why. These dues can finance the major portion of the National Budget.

The UCAOTSMC national association is the official voice for men within the National Church.


A Unifying Force

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

B.C. Conference(right), and Mayor John Beales for the township of Langley.
















Welcome to the Ladies

70th Anniversary Celebration

As a part of the opening ceremonies George Morrison paid tribute to Ryerson, the founding club from which AOTS grew. The Handshake wishes to substantiate Rev. Morris' remarks as to the achievement of this extraordinary group of men and the heritage they left us. Our reference is an unpublished history of AOTS by the late Dr. Harry

53 Dedicated men.

Under the leadership of a Dr.H Riggs, 53 men gathered to form the Ryerson AOTS

Club. Their first task at hand was to physically build a gymnasium for their church. Along the way they met regularly to devise a modus opperendi dedicated to service. They planned so well that our present day organization is similar in structure and the same in its objectives.

More Clubs

Within the year they encouraged the formation of several Vancouver clubs and soon after that a district council that encompassed the lower mainland. Next it was British Columbia and after the war, expansion to 700 clubs across Canada with a membership of over 10,000.

Trying Times

Although their plans for expansion were hindered by a depression and a war, their service to the community flourished. There was the establishment of a technical training school for the unemployed, the distribution of hundreds of Christmas Hampers and the gathering of food and clothing which they sent by the trainload to the prairie provinces. During the war they helped entertain the troops with concerts. They dedicated their lives to service.

We all owe a debt to the men of Ryerson and to those to whom they passed the torch of service. May the heritage of Christian love grow and prosper for years to come.

Entertainment





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The Devotional

What Was Jesus Really Like

By Andrew Knowles* Part II

By any reckoning Jesus was amazing. Born in Bethlehem, raised in Nazareth, and executed just outside of Jerusalem. Jesus never left the pocket handkerchief of a country then called Palestine. He left no writings or diaries, and all we know of him could be said and done in the course of a few weeks.

Yet his words and actions have fascinated great minds, inspired great deeds, and aroused great hopes ever since. To-day one third of the world's population professes to follow Jesus Christ, more than double the number of followers of any other of the great religions. In the West we date our calenders from the estimated year of his birth.

I am far within the mark when I say that all the armies that ever marched, and all the navies that ever sailed, and all the parliaments that ever sat, and all the kings that ever reigned put together, have not affected the life of man upon earth as has that one solitary life.

A Man Like Us:

What did the first disciples see in Jesus, as they walked the dusty roads with him, and visited the little towns of Galilee?

They saw a man like themselves. One who ate and slept and sweated and wept. A man whose feet got dirty and whose muscles ached. Nothing surprising in that.

But in other ways Jesus was quite extraordinary. Though not what we would call religious, he had a private life of prayer which was vital and mystifying. He called God "Father", and



urged his friends to do the same.

His stories, which were many, had an explosive quality. They somehow detonated in the mind blowing out a lot of prejudice, and letting in a lot of light. Ordinary people with no special education found his teaching riveting.

Peace:

And there were a lot of miracles. In a quiet almost self effacing way, Jesus helped and healed dozens of disabled people. The blind and lame, the deaf and dumb, even the disgusting and

untouchable lepers were restored to health, strength and independence. On a Few occasions he even brought the dead back to life.

Complete Trust

Above all Jesus was his own man and this in an exciting way. He had won inner peace. A peace which he could share with others. A peace which was grounded in his complete trust in God His Father.

Early in the morning, or late at night or in the heat of the day, Jesus would pause for prayer. The result was that however much he was hassled or interrupted, he never lost sight of who he was or what he had to do.

Embarrassing Side

And yet, it has to be admitted that there was a most embarrassing side to jesus. For one thing he kept company with the dregs of society. He liked nothing better than to dine with known cheats and thieves, and once allowed a prostitute to caress his feet, without even blushing.

He could be extremely rude. He accused some very distinguished people of play acting their beliefs and exploiting their status. In fact he told them in no uncertain terms that they stank. Some wonder that common people heard him gladly.
