

Bible Study Groups

As a young graduate student at the University of Toronto, Don was an outspoken atheist until one night in 1961 when, though his father's illness, he was confronted with the claims of Jesus Christ. Commitment followed, but so did a struggle with intellect until he could work out the validity of his new found Christian faith. Later on the campus of the University of Saskatchewan he was to challenge the atheists and communists to a public debate on the historical validity for the divinity for Jesus Christ. The Challenge was not accepted but in the meantime Don had become the faculty sponsor for a hundred University students who met for weekly Bible studies. He also became

involved in the teaching ministry of his local church.

Don is best known for his application of Biblical principles to current issues. In the last fifteen years he has spoken to hundreds of youth and church retreats, Christian clubs, executive seminars, prayer breakfasts, conferences and churches across Canada. His testimony and Christian convictions have also been shared with the Commonwealth Parliamentary Association and countless university audiences. For seven years he wrote a monthly newsletter for public servants on the application of Biblical principles in the work place and was the founder of 38 prayer and Bible study groups involved in the Public Service Christian Fellowship in Ottawa. He has also been a promoter of several national ministries that encourage those who are in authority over us.

Don's workshop will be based on his experience with Christian Fellowship Groups. Through him we will experience the genius of Prayer Study Groups and the amazing role they can play in our Christina lives.

What is Young Life? It is a nondenominational teen ministry whose objective is to reach out to teens with no church affiliation, to form personal relationships with them and to present the gospel message to them through Young Life Club activities. Young life is particularly interested in reaching teens that other youth ministries may miss, with an eventual goal of encouraging those young people to find a church home. Is Young Life only for the "young"? Although the main thrust of the program is geared towards teens, adults are encouraged to be a part, particularly in the area of sponsorship of local staff, organizational support and prayer support. And opportunities are available to go to camp! At our camp we had about 220 people from 19 to 79, (the 79 year old had undergone a hip replacement 29 days before camp, and had suffered a heart attack 2 days after the hip operation! But that didn't slow him down, his camp knick name was Wild Bill). So if you thought your days at camp were over, maybe its time to reconsider! I've just received the most recent edition of the "Handshake". My congratulations to you for having packed so much news and information into an excellent little

newsletter.

To bring you up to date on the Hospital Project- it was indeed a remarkable opportunity to get together with the AOTS on our trip across the country from Toronto to Van-

couver. Unfortunately I didn't realize that we were sitting next to one another in fact until we arrived in Vancouver and I overheard some AOTS conversation.

Men of the AOTS will be most interested to know that B.C. Clinics and

Hospitals have been selected to be participants in a program with the B.C. Ministry of Health in an attempt to improve health services to our rural areas.

We have been selected because I believe

we are seen to be something of a mod-

el of medical and health care, offered with a profound level of dedication on the part of our physicians, and at a very economical cost to the ministry and to the

cost to the minimum istry and to the communities involved.

At this point the Ministry has assisted

us with full computerization of our Hazelton, and Bella Coola offices. We have in place in Bella Coola physicians who are able to provide anaesthesia and surgery and cover a broad

range of services.

In Hazelton we are able to cover emergency surgery, and regular anaesthesia. You will be interested to know that our ophthalmology(eye) program continues with some strength at this point with a

visiting opthalmologist and with prospects of a permanent opthalmologist in place before mid '93.

The equipment provided by the AOTS both in our opthalmology and dental clinics continue to be well and extensively used and is gratefully acknowledged frequently by members of our communities.

God's blessings on all of your members and their very fine work.



Delbert Russel Poole was born Oct. 15th, 1882, on a farm near Woodstock Ont. A minister came through his district telling of the need of young men for religious work on the Canadian Prairies, which were rapidly opening at the time. Although not much more than a boy he responded to this call and found himself

doing student ministerial work on the Canadian Prairies, which were rapidly opening up at that time. Later he attended Brandon College but before graduating he went into YMCA work in Saskatoon and Toronto. He finally became Boy's Work Secretary of the National Council

of YMCA for Saskatchewan and Manito-

In 1926 he became National Boy's Work Secretary succeeding Taylor Statten. Following this he became General Secretary of the Religious Education Council of Canada. In 1946 he became part time Executive Secretary with a meager salary far below the worth of a man of his stature and caliber. In the decade of his tenure he did more to put the movement on a National basis than any other man. From Youth To Men and an inspiration to both throughout his lifetime.

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

"Now, you are just a nothing; you don't exist."


