

- 4. Read your bible daily and get a booklet like the Upper Room in order to follow as a guide for your devotions.



Project The Observer on Tape

History It was started by the disabled Committee in Winnipeg in 1983. In early 1985 when the chair person of the group moved from the area, they were no longer able to carry on the project.

At this time the NAtional AOTS was challenged to take over the project. Jack Arthur, Central Vice President of the National AOTS, presented the challenge to Oueen St. AOTS, Kingston, Ontario whose president Armando Del Gobbo was himself blind.

In July of 1985, Queen St. AOTS took over the project and has carried it since, taking it from 45 subscribers for the first issue, July 1985, to the nearly 400 subscribers in 1993.

How does it work?

Each month an advanced copy of the Observer is received and read onto three ninety minute tapes by Alta Maclean. She also describes the pictures and really brings the articles to life. Armando Del Gobbo, Chairman of the project introduces each months set with greetings from AOTS and information on the project.

A high speed copier is used to produce the required number of tapes to be sent out. The tapes are packed in special mailing pouches and go out to nearly four hundred subscribers across Canada.

It takes about 36 hours from the time that the advance copy is received to the time the tapes are mailed out. This is only possible by the fantastic hard work of the reader and the rest of the crew. It is a huge job and they deserve a great deal of credit for making it all happen.

After listening to the tapes, the subscriber returns them for re-use. In 1990, 13,506 tapes were handled five times each as they were unpacked, erased, copied and packed again for mailing.

There is no subscription cost for this service as Canada Post does not charge postage for this service and donations cover other expenses.


