A New National Approach


Bibles N' Prayers 900!

Service to Youth through four and a half decades

Yes that's right, some fourty five years ago a Harrow Scout leader requested and obtained, space in the church in which to conduct meetings. The Men's class which consisted of nine members worked hand in hand with the scout leaders. These men saw the need for a woodworking shop in which the scouts could construct various "merit winning" projects and also do a number of projects for the church.

In late 1949 a workshop was built by volunteer labour, on church property at a cost of \$1150.00. A three man committee from the stewards of the church board was responsible for the operation.

Enrollment of this woodworking operation had a steady growth with 12 members in 1951, 18 in by 1953, 26 by 1945 and 65 by 1990. In 1955 the club was organized as the Harrow-Malden AOTS Men's Club. The Church board appointed the Club president to act on the workshop committee.

In 1993 it was necessary to increase the floor space of the shop. This was completed and paid for by club members, The club now fully funds the

workshop and projects. An average enrollment of the last three years has been approximately 65, of which 50% are boy scouts and cubs who construct the "Kub Cars" with many of the scouts and clubs continuing with personal projects.

The enrolment is interdenominational and for boys and girls 9 to 13 years of age, the young people are encouraged to assist with projects of their choice among which are footstools, spiceracks, bird feeders, etc. They are encouraged to enter their completed projects in the annual Agricultural fair.

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Church & Community Service



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
As all members know the Harry Colnett Scholarship Program was established many years ago to encourage able and interested students to prepare for service in areas of food production and related research in developing countries.



Hospital **Project Update**



Where There is a Need

On a windswept coast deep within the rain forests of British Columbia, there lies the R.W. Large Memorial Hospital, about halfway between Vancouver and Prince Rupert. Enter a new born baby who decided to come into our world two or three months early. Such a premature baby needs and incubator to sustain her life. With such stormy conditions there is no way that we can get to one of the major cities in time. But wait, how about our own twenty year old incubator it has helped before. Now a twenty year old incubator is just waiting to pack it in and when if does our baby may die. Although Bela Bella is connected to the outside world by both boat several days a week and by aeroplane the former takes at least 24 hours the latter can't get in or out during such bad weather conditions.

A worst case scenario? Well perhaps, but it was one that the staff at the R.W. Large Memorial saw as a real possibility when they chose as their first need priority a new new-born incubator with a bilirubin light system. If we had the space we would give you Dr. Peter' description of just what an incubator does for a premature besides supplying baby oxygen and a warm environment. Simply put many of these babies have immature livers which can not get rid of the toxins that can eventually kill them. A bilirubin light system gives off ultra violet light which penetrates the baby's's skin and breaks down the toxins until the liver matures enough in a few days to handle the job by itself.

The need is there and under the direction

of the hospital staff and Dr. Peter, that is where your funds have ben directed. We have been promised a photograph of this medical instrument in action so we can show it off all across Canada. In the meanwhile feel good about yourselves.

One more thing, you can also be proud of the fact that your support of the Handshake and the production of the Hospital Brochure has caused a retired physician and his wife to offer their services as relief at one of the United Church Hospitals. Our readers will remember our appeal for help from physicians some issues back. This topped by the most recently published hospital brochure has triggered a doctor to help. The two of us, namely myself Bill Hastings and John Carswell want to thank the rest of you for your support and help to get this information out and we share the feeling of accomplishment W.G.H with you.

Youth Ministries & AOTS by Member at Large Bruce Martin Also President of Vancouver Island DC

In response to President John's letter of October 1,1993 I contacted the Victoria Presbytery Youth and Young Adult Ministries Co-ordinator Cathy Wallace and she provided me with a very good report re the status of youth and young adult groups at all 22 churches in the

Presbytery. Her report also contained good comments from most of the leaders.

Comments

Statistically 8 churches had leaders and groups, 2 had groups but no leaders 12 had no groups at all. A relatively sad picture leaving much room for improvement.

Several leaders expressed dismay at the lack of understanding and appreciation by their congregation for the youth and vice versa. There is a need for greater interaction between youth, young adults and adult congregations.

I was present at a meeting of the "Friends of the Interfaith Chaplaincy at the University of Victoria. I was given five minutes on their agenda to speak about AOTS and the desire of our National Council to be more supportive of youth Ministries etc. Henry Lock, the United Church Chaplain of the University of Victoria, sent me a letter and expressed appreciation for our recognition of youth and the young adults and the Campus Ministries.

Conclusions

My observations are that many of our clubs are putting their energies into supporting and raising money for physical things around their churches instead of "Investing in people not Things". National should encourage clubs to offer scholarship funds to their Conference C.E. Institution and or give encouragement and financial support to even 1 or 2 youth in their congregation to enable them to attend youth religiously oriented gatherings.

"Me and My God" was the theme of the 1994 Round Up which took place April 15 to 17 at the National YMCA Conference Centre, Geneva Park, near Orillia Ont. Some 101 men in all shared in the weekend of enlightened a spiritual study (the Psalms), musical uplift, fine food and accommodation and above everything great Christian Fellowship.

In the next issue we witness the Parable of the "Good Samaratan" in a Brahman setting.


Believe It Before You See It.

The apostle Thomas has often been criticized for his lack of faith concerning the the resurrection of Jesus Christ. During one of Jesus' resurrection appearances, he came to the disciples when they were hiding together in a room in Jerusalem. Thomas was not present. Later the disciples told Thomas what they had seen. Thomas boldly declared.

"Unless I see in His hands the print of the nails, put my finger into the print of the nails, and put my hands into His side, I will not believe." (John 20:25). Thomas was a man of conviction.

Eight days later, Jesus again appeared to the disciples still in hiding. Only this time Thomas was present. Jesus said to Thomas." Reach your finger here, and look at My hands; and reach your hand here, and put it into My side. Do not be unbelieving, but believing." And Thomas answered and said to Him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, Thomas, because you have seen Me, you believed.



Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed. (John 20:27-29).

A characteristic of Thomas has often been overlooked. Earlier in Jesus' ministry when he received mounting resistance from Jewish leaders in Jerusalem, all of the disciples tried to persuade Him not to return to Judea. Thomas was the only disciple who boldly proclaimed, "Let us also go, that we may di with him" John 11:16

Thomas was able to make a decision and stick with it. The difficulty for Thomas was not his lack of faith in Jesus, but in his concrete thinking.

When Jesus was alive and there was no hope for apolitical messianic kingdom led by Jesus, Thomas was willing to die for His cause. But once Jesus was dead, Thomas' dream of freedom from the Roman overlords was finished. His locked in thinking kept him from invisioning and believing in an even greater kingdom.

Thomas teaches us not to pour our plans in concrete. Allow God to do the impossible in your life. Expect a miracle. Commit yourself completely as Thomas did. But do not allow locked in thinking to keep you from anticipating the impossible. You have to believe before you see it.

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
