Where do Men Fit into the United Church Today? (Charlie Shave)

I am sure it can be safely said that in just about every United Church across Canada today there are men who have been at one time, are presently going or through some kind of crisis, or as the Psalmist pharses it ... "in the very depths of depair." They cry alone, there are doubts, dor pressures, temptations, fears, insecurity, marital breakdowns, abuse of some ind. Thank God the majority e it through with counselling, Bible reading, prayer, friends. Others who become secret alcholics, drug addicts, and still others commit suicide.

I witnessed one U.C. man give his life to Christ one night in Victoria who, later upon moving to Calgary, took his own life. His marriage breakup and drugs were too much.

How many men do you know who are going through some kind of crisis at this very moment and what are you doing about it, other than saying "HI" on a Sunday morning?

What can church men do?

First of all, they need to know there are brothers out there who care, and the way to do it is through gut rel sharing whereby men alone. Scary?? .. You bet it is! But you either want to be a channel for Christ

to work through or your channel is blocked because of your own ego. God is teaching some of us His deepest lessons and so often brothers in the same church are going through similar situations and we don't even know it!

And so we help by caring, sharing and drawing closer together in the bond of love.

Secondly, we become prayer warriors and covet to get alone with God. We pray childlike daily in simplicity for the world around us. God is not confined. He has His own resources and can answer ten thousand prayer in different ways.

Thirdly, we throw away our our scripts with all expectations. We have no quarantee we will be alive tomorrow, and so we plan our day around God and not our job. We ask Christ to take over our wills, to speak through us, think through us, hear through us, love through us, see through our eyes, flow through our very being. Paul says "I daily (to self) yet not I but Christ liveth in me. He must increase and I must decrease ... "

Fourthly, accept our circumstances in life. Stop looking for results ... do your best ... Pray and leave the results to God. Remember He is working in us for eternity and what we don't understand now we will later.

Fifth, accept people where they are ... never condemn. We are all in different spaces on different levels. When a young Christian fails to come up to your standards or expectations of what a Christian should be, pray that God will reveal the qualities that you lacking in him or her, and pray for humility yourself.

Sixth, we are to be "fishers of men", and as such we are to sit quietly in our boats with our lures (testimonies) at the ready, and when the fish (people) approach, we merely tell them what Christ has done in our lives and leave the rest to God.

Seventh ... we learn to accept and love ourselves. To forget past mistakes and to get on with living. Remember God's love is new every morning and He loves us unconditionally. When the father met the prodigal son, he did not ask him if he was divorced, or if he had robbed or murdered. secret to loving ourselves is to start allowing people to love us ... do things for like a flower us, and opening up to the sunlight, before long we too expressing love.

Of course there are other ways men fit into the church today through holding



From the National Archives

15th Biennial AOTS Convention held in Regina is now history and the Record of Proceedings etc. will be filed along side the other 17 Conventions what we have had over some 35 vears. Should those numbers confuse you it is because three conventions were held before we became part of the Board of Men under the new banner of UCAOTSMC. This change gives rise to a tale which will bear telling at a later

Your archivist who has attended a good many of these gatherings hastens to add that the 15th was top drawer.

Let's go back to 1961 when Vancouver and District Council sponsored the 2nd biennial convention. Charlie itt, the first President under the new UCAOTSMC finished out his two year term at the Vancouver event. Members of that convention

included Bill committee Hastings, Charlie Burritt, Phil Spense, Dr. Poole, Dudley McLeod, Fred Karre Syling, Middleton, Gordon and Alex Gilmore Bromlee.

Watching the Regina Convention brought back a lot of memories. We were unable to get a firm number and we ended up in the high 600's with the men and their wives. We had planned a momento for the ladies and men in the form of plates and Indian crafts and of course we ran out of these at about the 500 mark.

One thing Regina had going for it was the closeness of sleeping, eating and meeting facilities. Our Convention in Vancouver was the second on campus location and the first convetion that UBC had put on. Confusion reigned when UBC reneged upon the procedures to be provided the night before. Some how under the direction of Fred Middleton we struggled through but not before we had bent a lot of feelings and created some life time scars.

We planned the convention with no terms of reference resented any interference from the National. How dare they ask for a budget! Who do they think they are criticising our choice of speaker! finally came to heel and showed a profit of \$500.00 spend on which was printing of the Order of (We had Proceedings. profit realized the jacking up the registration fee at the last minute over protest and resignation of the committee chairman in charge.

Our opening session took the form of a luncheon complete with the Mayor of Vancouver, UBC's President, provincial Cabinet Lieutenant the Minister, Govenor and one half of the Scarborough AOTS choir (the other half hadn't left the airport by the time we sat down, but praise be they made it in time to sing for us). For the main banquet we sat down close to 700 (100 had to be put in a smaller room with a PA speaker).

Our weather was three days of glorious sunshine. it had cleared just before the meetings started and it started raining again just after the close.

I am looking forward to the 16th Convention in Cape Breton in 1989, the 17th in Windsor in 1991, and the 18th in BC in 1993.

ED. NOTE: 1993 will be the 70th anniversary of start of the AOTS movement at Ryerson United Church in Vancouver. It seems appropriate that Convention that year will be in BC. The location is not yet set but you can look forward to some additional memories in the archives as it gets closer.
