118 people from the United Church's six Central Conferences - London, Manitou, Hamilton, Toronto, Bay of Quinte and Montreal/Ottawa attended a weekend Round-Up April 23 - 25, 2004 at the Salvation Army's Jackson Point Conference Centre.

The conference was hosted by Bay of Quinte AOTS and featured theme speaker, Rev. Ed Bentley, Senior Pastor of Eastminster United Church, Belleville, and weekend Chaplain, Rev. Richard Parker, currently serving in the Eldad/Hampton Pastoral Charge, who conducted the Sunday Communion Service. The Saturday Night entertainers were Boyd Warren and Friends, while the ministry of music was provided by the Watson family - Craig, Betty, son Jim and grandson, Andrew. Chuck Wilson led the youth activities.

The conference theme, "Maintaining Faith in a Changing World" was addressed by Rev. Ed on three occasions giving us much to ponder.

The Central Region Council met at the start of the conference and decided to divide \$3,500 among the six conferences in support of church camping activities.

This year, the Bay of Quinte organizers awarded posthumously the ART HARDING TRO-PHY for meritorious service to Gary Wilson, who died during the past year of ALS. Gary's brother Bill, and nephew, Chuck, received the trophy on behalf of Carol, Gary's wife.

Resolutions presented at the Central Region Round-Up (taken from the Record of Proceedings)

The wording of these resolutions captures the intention of the resolution, but is not word for word.

- 1. Whereas some members have served lengthy terms in the position of club secretary or club treasurer, this service should be recognized. The motion was to recommend to the national AOTS office that a lapel pin, similar in style to a past president pin, be designed for both secretary and treasurer.
- 2. Whereas there is a need to accurately reflect the membership in AOTS, and to create a database from which lists could be retrieved for use of committees planning conventions, round-ups, nomination committee use and other specific purposes and, to create a mailing list to better budget newslet-

ter mailings and to be able to accurately calculate percentages in competitions, this need should be recognized by the National Office of AOTS.

The address concluded with a plenary discussion which did raise some interesting topics and demonstrated Rev. Ed's skill at responding to any questions.



Helping the Physically Challenged

"As One That Serves" Men's Club of St. Paul's United Church, Tillsonburg, Ontario, helped put into the sanctuary the necessary equipment and the manpower to record each Sunday Service on audiotapes to be delivered to our church members who are unable to attend church.

We presently have three members to whom we deliver tapes on Monday or Tuesday each week. There are other church members who, for various reasons, don't want to avail themselves of our service. Some of their reasons include: "Don't have a machine," "I fall asleep too easily." "I'm physically unable to push the buttons on the machine and I'm too proud to ask for help." As Chairman and the only delivery person, I hear every excuse or reason - so be it! We are only here to serve.

Our audiotape technicians number five men who take turns and do a fine job. Those who receive our service are most appreciative. As long as there is a need, we will continue this service.

Intergenerational activity

Some months ago, the 2nd Scout Troop of Tillsonburg appealed to us for some direction in how to raise funds. After some discussion, we offered them a partnership in our "Beef Supper" fund raiser.

The St. John's people sup-

ply twenty pies and we do the same. They supply plenty of labour and we supply our Banquet Hall and Kitchen. After expenses, we split 50/50 which came to \$1,038. each.

We fed 230 people and the compliments were flying. We solved our labour problems and they found a way to raise money. We're on again for next year. Our money supports two children we adopted through the Foster Parent

Our club has 26 members with 12 on the executive. The latter is very active as most of our members are 75+. We hold executive meetings every 2nd Monday and dinner meetings on the 4th Monday of each month, except July and August when it is at the call of the chair.

At our dinner meetings we usually have an interesting speaker and always a spirited devotional with a sing-a-long.

In January, we elected a new slate of officers with Clarence Langdon replacing Jim Edison as President.

We have done several projects for our church, such as painting the kitchen, and spring clean-up of the grounds. We also provided the Board of Management \$1,500 to paint the Christian Education Center. In addition, we honoured our annual contribution of \$1,000 to our church and we presented a cheque for \$2,600 to the Board of Management on Thanksgiving Sunday.

We raised our funds with the usual projects - Lumberjack Takeout, selling Mooseburgers at Botwood Day (our usual Fisherman's Brews was unavailable due to the high cost of fish). A Flea Market and Bake Sale on October 18th raised nearly \$1,400.

We helped welcome a new Minister - The Rev. John. Some of the members travelled to St. Anthony to help with the transfer of his furniture. The club also purchased a computer desk for the office.

The Club donated to our regular charities and we sponsored two boys to the Loon Bay Summer Camp.

We brought the Travelling Gavel to the Bishop's Falls Club and enjoyed a special night of fellowship and entertainment. We visited the Salvation Army Men's Service Club for a night of fellowship and devotions and the Anglican Men's Service Club to help celebrate the visit of their Bishop.

In May, we hosted National President Elect (now National President) Ernie Paddock. In a very impressive ceremony, he inducted four new members into our club.

For the coming year: we hosted a district meeting of United Church Men's Service Clubs in April and we will be looking at the upgrading of the sound system in the sanctuary. We will also be hosting the annual fellowship rally at Loon Bay.

As you see, we have not been idle. A lot of hard work has been done under the leadership of president Clarence and Project Chairman, Les Curlew, and the help of the whole club. With God's help we will carry on.

Reading: Ephesians 2: 4-10

Theme: Why are we here?

We are on a journey of discovery, a journey which leads both outwards and inwards. WHAT we believe affects HOW we live, and our experiences affect WHAT we believe,. These are not TWO journeys but ONE, because they each depend on one another.

We journey Outwards in service to others and in trying to build a better, loving society. At the same time we journey Inwards, providing personal satisfaction from our actions, and joy through helping others.

The outward journey provides the means for the development of loving relationships in every sphere of life, with all races, creeds and faiths. It is a practical expression of the principles we try to follow, as demonstrated in the life of Jesus.

The journey inwards is a discovery of meaning, a test of our belief and an exploration of our spirituality within the Christian way of life.

Service to others is not dependent on there being Christians, an example of which is adequately revealed in the parable of the Good Samaritan. This is well demonstrated in today's society, when we have so many volunteers helping others experiencing difficult times - for example, during the forest fires of last summer when volunteers housed and cared for the evacuees, the ever present need to support the various Food Banks and many other services so necessary for present-day living.

As a faith community, and particularly as AOTS Members, we are involved in many of these various activities, we are well aware of the needs of a growing number of people in our society. To be effective, we should listen now and always for the voice of God, to know His will as revealed in Christ Jesus, and do this while ignoring World opinions.

Harry Colnett Scholarship Program International Agriculture and Food Distribution

- 1. The National Association of United Church AOTS Men's Clubs will provide funds for provision of one scholarship of \$1,000 for Canadian or Bermudian students who wish to study agriculture, food sciences, fisheries, or food distribution, preparatory for services related to food production in developing countries.
- 2. The major purpose of the scholarship is to provide financial assistance to a worthy student and, thereby, encourage good students to increase their interest in world food problems, and to obtain technical competence in some phase of the production and distribution of food.
- 3. The money will be available to the candidate enrolling in a university program in which emphasis is placed on some aspect of food production and processing, such as agriculture, food sciences, fisheries, home economics, etc.
- 4. To qualify for a scholarship, the applicant must have completed a minimum of one year of study at an accredited institution. Applicants must enrol in a curriculum of an agricultural nature or otherwise related to the area of food production, processing, storage or distribution. The applicant must be a resident of Canada or Bermuda and plan to enrol for study during the forthcoming academic year.
- 5. Applications and general information are available on request. Applicants should submit the following:
 - a) A one or two page letter of application. It is suggested that this letter should provide the selection committee with the applicant's understanding of and dedication to service in the area of world food production.
 - b) Transcript revealing course selection and grades achieved to date.
 - c) Letters from two referees.

National AOTS Music Program, 2004

To establish a fund that will provide a pool of money from which to allocate bursaries to future musicians in the United Churches, the Manitoba District Council sponsored concerts within the City of Winnipeg. In the fall of 1997, District Council asked the Music Director of Grey Street United Church, which has an AOTS Club, to solicit suggestions and opinions from some of his colleagues. As a result, a concert was held in Crescent-Fort Rouge United Church in 1998, with performers consisting mainly of Church choirs plus individual adult and youth soloists or musicians. This concert provided seed money for the first group of five bursary applicants, who were then asked to participate in the fund raising concert for the following year.

Concerts subsequent to the first have displayed the talents of some of the bursary recipients of the previous year's successful applicant pool of youth musicians, as well as a number of church choirs and individual musicians. Bursary applications have not been sought since the 2001 concert year, until the April mailing was made in 2004.

Some suggestions follow that may be of assistance to any who contemplate the concert template to raise funds for bursaries.

- 1) Preparation is essential discuss within your Club membership what you expect to gain. For example, do you want a continued youth presence in your church or your club, etc. Then, if the project is workable, assign several individuals to assume responsibility for specified tasks, such as:
- a) Location: Obtain permission from a suitable church for the use of a hall or sanctuary to stage a concert at a specified date and time.
- b) Program: Select performers for the concert. The Chancel, Youth or Cherub choirs, or individuals from your own churches are a good source of musical talent. Consider the length of the show 11/2 to 2 hours in length is likely adequate.
- c) Publicity: Print posters to be distributed amongst the local churches and/or Presbytery. Do not forget the local community and your church bulletins.
- d) Tickets: Prices charged in Winnipeg were \$10 for adults and \$6 for youth, 16 years and under (student age limits and prices may vary). Tickets were printed and distributed by the AOTS members.

2) Additional Information:

- a) Expenses: Covered by Manitoba District Council for the first two years, after which the program became self-supporting.
- b) Rehearsals: None were held. Individuals and groups were allocated a specific time frame (e.g. 12 minutes) for their performances.
 - c) Participants: Their time was donated. Some even donate money!
- d) Bursary Applications: Form letters and applications were sent originally to AOTS churches, then to a dozen area churches, and in 2004, to all United Churches (39) in the Winnipeg Presbytery.

Good News from Richard Dietriche

First, the editor apologizes to Richard for not including his submission for the Spring Issue in which he requests individual members to write to their MP about the need for action against Sex Offenders.

Richard persisted in his campaign to have something done. The Good News is that in July, Richard received a letter from the Deputy Prime Minister, the Honourable Anne McLellan, thanking him for his concern and advising him that,

"The new Sex Offender Information Registration Act has been passed and will result in the creation of the National Sex Offender Registry."

"Under the Act, persons convicted of a sex offence listed in the legislation will be obligated to register within 15 days of conviction or release from prison. They will be required to re-register annually and every time they change addresses. Registrants will report to local police who will collect addresses and other personal information set out in the Act to be imputed to the Sex Offender Database that will be maintained by the RCMP. The sex offender database will allow police to conduct a search according to a full or partial address and the offence of a sex offender or both."

She concludes the letter with, "Thank you again for taking the time to share the concerns of your organization on this important initiative."

The Church and Community Services Committee is pleased to report that the first recipient of the 2004 Harry Colnett Scholarship of \$1,000 is Ms Jenna Templer of Windsor, Ontario.

Jenna is a fourth year student in the Environmental Engineering Undergraduate Co-op Program at the University of Windsor. This program focuses on the collection, treatment and distribution of water.

Commencing her undergraduate work in the fall of 2000, Ms Templer has since shown by her academic credentials that she is fascinated by her studies, and plans to continue her education through a Master's Program in Environmental Engineering. During the fall of 2003, she was one of a group of ten Canadians, headed by consulting engineer, Dr. Norm Becker, to work on a two-year old project to bring filtered water to two poor neighbouring villages in the Shandong province of China. Her travels in China and the work on the water purification and distribution systems have heightened her awareness of the desperate need for clean water in developing areas. Early this year, she was in Europe on a study trip concerning her environmental studies.

We have received glowing recommendations from her Professor and from the Associate Dean of Engineering Research and Graduate Studies concerning her "multi-disciplinary skills, her strong understanding of applying theory to solving practical problems", and her "commitment to working in developing countries in the area of water resources." After noting that she is also the highest ranking undergraduate student in this program, we are pleased to offer the Harry Colnett Scholarship to Jenna Templer.

Presentation of the scholarship was made by Bob Lewis at the AOTS Father and Son Banquet held in Harrow United Church on April 1st. About 100 fathers and sons were in attendance.
